#### **GREAT LIVES**

Keith Bradshaw gave a moving account of the lives of a brother and sister well known in Germany, Hans and Sophie Scholl. They were born in 1918 and 1921 respectively and were enthusiastic supporters of Hitler when he came into power in 1933 and they joined Hitler youth. Soon they became disillusioned and started the dangerous activity of printing and distributing anti Nazi leaflets. Somehow they evaded detection till 1943 when they were arrested with a colleague, suffered brutal Gestapo interrogations and were then executed by guillotine.

Keith had put a lot of effort into his presentation so it was a pity that only nine of the twenty five people signed up for the group heard him.

Thank you Keith for a fascinating tale of a couple previously unknown to me who showed true bravery in following their consciences whatever the consequences.

Great Lives talks held in the Castleberg Room at the Victoria Hall on the third Wednesday of the month are open to all U3A members so, if one might interest you, do come along even if you have not signed up for the group.

Members may well remember Alec Guinness playing the part of Colonel Nicholson in the Bridge over the River Kwai. Colonel Nicholson was based on the real life of Colonel Toosey, a man whom John Parry met and who will be the subject of his Great Life on Wednesday, 21st November.
