We started the evening with a nice medium dry wine from the Loire Valley—Domaine Brurd Vouvry (2004, 11.5%, £6.99). It was well received.

Next came an Italian, Pinot Grigio Ramato (2005, 12.5%, £6.44). A rose colour, fruity bouquet, soft and dry.

The third white, a Reisling, Lenz Moser Prestige (2004, 12.5%, £7.99) from Austria had a mixed reception.

Back to France for Curel Des Piernes Rouges (2005, 12.5%, £6.99). Some Macon reds are unremarkable.

Let's try a new area—Cata Mayor Merlot Tannat from Uruquay (2005, 12.5%). Lovely ruby tones with deep violet streaks.

Last of all, El Emperador Cabernet– Carmener Chile (2005, 13.5%, £6.99). Deep coloured with purple hues, dark berries and very smooth tannins. We enjoyed. **TM**
