**Looking at Old Buildings:** The November meeting was a visit to two religious buildings, Farfield Quaker Meeting House and Bolton Priory. We were welcomed at Farfield by a member of the Religious Society of Friends who, before giving us a fascinating account of the foundations of both the Society and the building, invited us to sit quietly and experience the silence of a Friends' meeting. We admired the simplicity of the building and its barn-like structure. In the burial ground outside we examined the unique chest tombs of the Myers family.

At Bolton Priory entry is through a tower which only received its roof in the 1980s—about 400 years after the tower was built. King Henry VIII put paid to the roof by dissolving the Priory but he inadvertently saved the Portico which was due for demolition when the tower was completed. Our excellent guide outlined the history of the Priory and the various roles of the Augustinian canons. She pointed out some very interesting features such as an ancient stone altar table, the stained glass windows, a model of the Prior pre-C16 and the beautiful colour paintings of Madonna lilies and various herbs behind the altar.

This was a very enjoyable and informative day spent, as usual, in good company.

**Thursday group:** The group returned to a favourite venue for November, the Bolton Abbey Estate, with its 80 miles of footpaths. The route chosen this time took us over Little Hare Head and Middle Hare Head, down through the Strid Woods and along the river path to the Cavendish Pavillion (tea, of course) and our car in the car park—about 7 miles of not (too) difficult walking. The weather was magnificent, the views superb and the autumn colours unbelievable; a truly memorable day.

**Wine Group 1:** The Spanish Casillo de Almansa, 2005, Sauvignon Verdejo was considered to be well worth its £4.49 price, while the second white, Hawkes Bay's Trinity Hill Sauvignon Blanc was deemed to exceed it in nose, flavour and depth—and price—£7.99.

"It would be nice/different with food" has been a comment often heard at our tastings—so we put it to the test, having two reds with refreshments arranged by Shirley and Ray. The Castillo de Almansa 2002 Tempranillo/Monastrel/Grenache (£4.99) and a Siglo Rioja 2004 at £5.99 (on offer £3.99) complemented well, the latter particularly so. The evening was rounded off very happily appreciating the qualities of Yalumba Shiraz/Viognier 2003 (£6.99).

**Wine Groups 2:** At the November meeting we tried a white wine from France. 13% vol, Pasquiers dry Muscat 2004 at £4.59 was voted disappointing. The next white, Etchart Privado, 13%, Torontoes—Chardonnay, again was not popular at £4.79. The reds were very welcome: Chateau Roc Vieux Pinot Noir, 2005, vol 13.5%, from the Loire was smooth, fruity and very satisfying at £6.29. The last wine of the evening, a South African Pinotage, Table Bay 2005, vol 13.5%, at £5.49 met with happy approval of this full-bodied wine. **TM**

*In case anyone hasn't already heard, we have learned via Craven U3A of a special Police Notice issued recently about a scam:*

A card is posted through your door from a company called PDS (Parcel Delivery Service) suggesting that they were unable to deliver a parcel and that you need to contact them on 0906 6611911 (a premium rate number). DO NOT call this number, as this is a mail scam originating from Belize. If you call the number and you start to hear a recorded message you will already have been billed £15 for the phone call.
